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# Back to the future! A review of the past 60 years of Animal Technology

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#### Introduction


A continuous aim for people working with animals in research is to improve the health and wellbeing of the animals used. Organisations such as the NC3Rs, UAR and the IAT work to share information for this continued development. During the cleaning out of an old unit at King's College London a collection of copies of The Journal of the Institute of Animal Technicians were found, dating back to 1966. It was decided that we would look back at the time period between 1966 and 1986 to see how far we have come in the last 57 years by comparing these journals with modern copies of Animal Technology and Welfare Journal between 2016 and 2021.

# Replacement


By comparing the subjects of articles it can be seen that the number of articles involving NHP, guinea pigs, farm animals and cats have reduced and the percentage of articles involving the use of rodents and fish has increased. Articles within old journals also discussed the use of rabbits instead of dogs (March 1970) and the use of marmosets instead of larger NHPs (May 1976).




**Figure 1.** The subject of articles from The Journal of the Institute of Animal Technicians September 1966-December 1986 (top) compared to papers from Animal Technology and Welfare Journal April 2016-December 2021 (bottom).

#### Refinement

The quality of caging has improved since the 1960s. Cages are now larger, we have a greater focus on enrichment and allowing animals to show natural behaviours. As well as an increase in articles focussed on technician training and animal handling. Surgical techniques, especially aseptic techniques and the use of PPE has improved. The greater availability of animal strains may have also led to better science.



**Figure 2:** The average number of adverts showing animal suppliers (blue), and animal cage manufacturers (red) per year between September 1966-December 1986.




**Figure 3:** The average number of adverts per species per year from all suppliers between September 1966-December 1986.

\*NHP included marmosets, tamarins, owl monkeys, macaques and baboons. Chimpanzee cage sizes had no available comparison.
