Housing

Nonhuman primates (NHP) are always group housed, as this maintains socialisation and encourages natural behaviour (Figure 1).

Toys

Toys are provided with the aim of helping to keep them stimulated and entertained. NHPs receive a combination of both hard and soft toys. These are rotated on a weekly basis to allow a variety and to prevent boredom (Figure 2).

Mirrors

Mirrors are placed outside the front of the home pen so the NHPs can manipulate them to observe areas around the room (Figure 3).

Enrichment

Offered daily in rotation to provide variety and includes:

Dietary enrichment

- fresh fruit or vegetables, seeds, nuts (Figure 4)

Sensory enrichment

- popcorn and bread freshly prepared outside the animal rooms
